## NARRATIVE

Adverse weather conditions constantly hampered the squadron's operations throughout the greater part of the period covered by this report. This was almost a repetition of the conditions explained by a previous report. Every possible hour that planes could be flown was utilized, and despite this handicap, the squadron managed to fly a total of 678.4 hours.

We consider that under ideal conditions it is possible for each pilot assigned to the squadron to fly a maximum of six hours per drill, and the total hours actually flown would represent approximately 44 per cent of the total possible flying time. Of course, this percentage does not take into account the loss of pilot hours due to non-attendance of drills.

The squadron was assigned to 15 days active duty from 5 August to 19 and during this period flew a total of 1,054.8 hours, or 53 per cent of the total possible, using the formula set forth in the foregoing paragraph. In addition to adverse weather, part of the flying time was out due to shortage of fuel available at this station. This fact has been made the subject of in an earlier report.

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Historical Report Narrative Continued

No change has been instituted in the squadron recruiting policy since the squadron is and has been at T/O strength. A waiting list has been maintained and individuals are continually being called in to take care of normal attrition.

Fifty-three officers and one hundred-twenty enlisted men attended maneuvers for the 15 day annual training period.
