



INTRODUCTORY SUMMARY

During the period covered by this report, Marine Attack Squadron-251 was located at the U. S. Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro (Santa Ana), California. The Commanding Officer from 1 March through 31 March 1753 was Lieutenant Colonel Harold A. HATTOOD 08535/7302, U. S. Marine Corps. This squadron a unit of Marine Aircraft Group-15. During the period 1 March 1953 through 31 March 1953, Marine Attack Squadron-251 conducted an intensive training program designed to qualify all Naval Aviators and Naval Aviation Pilots, assigned to this squadron, for combat in the newly assigned AD type aircraft. Due to the limited facilities and targets available for use by this squadron at MCAS, El Toro, twenty-nine (29) officers and one hundred twelve (112) enlisted men were deployed to Naval Auxilary Air Station, El Centro, California for the period & March 1753 to 28 March 1753 during which time all pilots assigned to this squadron received a minimum of forty-five (45) hours flight time in the AD aircraft. For further breakdown of flight time and training during this period see APPENDIX V.

This squadron is preparing for deployment to Korea in June 1953.

3 March 1953 to 6 March 1953

Squadron operations consisted of familiarization and section tactic flights for all pilots assigned.

4 March 1953

The last seven (7) F4U-4 aircraft were transferred to VMAT-10 this date.

5 March 1)53

Mr. W. L. PHEIFFER, representive of the Douglas Aircraft Corporation, was assigned to this squadron.

7 March 1953

Mr. RILEY and Mr. WOLGRESS, representives of the Curtiss Wright Aircraft Corporation presented a lecture on the performance and capabilities of the 3350-26 engine.

8 March 1953

Twenty-mine (29) officers and one hundred twelve (112) enlisted men departed for NAAS, El Centro, California for a period of twenty-one (21) days intensive training. Fourteen AD aircraft were flown by squadron pilots to NAAS, El Centro this date.

9 March 1953

Two (2) AD-3 aircraft joined from NAS Alameda.

Flight operations were confined to familiarization, section and division tectics.

10 March 1953

Angle calibration hops were flown by all pilots. Thirty (30), fifty (50), and seventy (70) degree dives were used. Seventy (70) degree dives were discontinued due to excessive oil leaks, believed to be caused by the extreme dive angles.

11 March 1953

Captain James R. BLUNT, Intelligence Officer, gave a lecture on close air support to Naval Air Intelligence school at NAS Alemeda, California.

13 March 1953

The first night familiarization hop in the AD aircraft was flown this date.

15 March 1953

Two (2) AD-3 Aircraft were joined from NAS Moffett.

Eighteen collisted men detailed to the Maintenance Course on the AD aircraft at NAS San Diego, California, completed their course of instruction and returned to MCAS, El Toro.

24 March 1953

The first night bombing hops were flown using flare pots to outline the target.

25 March 1953

Captain Kennoth A. LUND encountered a complete engine failure while on a night bombing hop in an AD-3 aircraft Bureau No. 122745 and sustained Class B injuries while bailing out. Captain LUND was picked up by a helicopter from NAAS El Centra and returned to the infirmary at NAAS, El Centra, California. He was then transferred to the Naval Hospital at San Diego. The cause of the engine failure could not be determined.

26 March 1953

The first night strafing hops were flown this date.

28 March 1953

The squadron returned from NAAS, El Centro, California.

30 March 1953

Flight operations were confined to Ground Controlled Approach. Pilots qualified or requalified with five (5) approaches each.

15 January 1953

At 1348 this date, Second Lieutenant Edward M. BELFORD 054177/7301 USMCR, experienced a landing gear failure during a landing roll out at MCAS El Toro, California. Lieutenant BELFORD was flying an F4U-4 Modex No. AL-15 Bureau No. 20371. Both Pilot and plane sustained Class D injuries and damage. The cause of this accident was unknown.

23 January 1953

Six (6) officers and six (6) enlisted men were detached for temporary additional duty to Marine Training Group-10 for Carrier Qualification aboard the USS Sicily.

25 January 1953

Thirteen (13) officers were detached for temporary additional duty under instructions to the Tactical Air Support School at the Naval Amphibious Base, Coronado, California.

27 January 1953

Three (3) planes from this squadron participated in a close air support problem at Camp Pendleton.

29 January 1953

Eleven (11) planes from this squadron participated in a close air support problem at Camp Pendleton.

30 January 1953

Thirteen (13) officers detailed to the Tactical Air Support School, completed their course of instructions and returned to MCAS El Toro, California.

31 January 1953

Nine (9) officers and eleven (11) enlisted men were transferred during the month of January 1953 to Service Squadron AirFMFPac for assignment to an overseas replacement draft.

For further breakdown of flight time during January 1953 see APPENDIX III. 1 February 1953

Five (5) officers were detached for temporary additional duty under instructions to the Tactical Air Support School at the Naval Amphibious Base, Coronado, California.

Twenty-four (24) officers and ninety-five (95) enlisted men departed for NAAS, El Centro, California for a period of seven days intensive training with the F4U-4 aircraft. This period stressed pilot training in rockets, strafing and bombing.

5 February 1953

Captain Stanley H. CARPENTER 048995/7301, USMC, while parked in an F4U-4, AL-7 Bureau No. 97125, was struck in the left temple by the valve

of a CO-2 fire bottle. The fire bottle was standing upright in the middle of the taxi way leading into the magazine loading area at NAAS El Centro, California, and was struck by the propeller of AL-15 Bureau No. 20271 piloted by Major Robert J. BARPOUR 021057/7302 USMC. AL-7 and AL-15 both received Class D damage and Captain CARPENTER received Class C injuries. Captain CARPENTER was wearing a H-3 protective helmet which was cracked from the force of the flying metal (CO-2 fire bottle valve). It is believed that this protective helmet saved the life of the pilot.

7 February 1953

The squadron returned this date from El Centro.

Five (5) officers detailed to the Tactical Air Support School, completed their course of instructions and returned to MCAS, El Toro, California. 3 February 1953

Twenty-three (23) enlisted men were detached for temporary additional duty under instructions to the maintenance course on the AD aircraft at NAS, San Diego, California.

11 February 1953

The first two (2) AD type aircraft were received in this squadron from NAS Alameda, California.

An inspection of the squadron Post Office was conducted by AirFMFPac postal representives.

13 February 1953

The squadron Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Sumner H. WHITTEN 06995/7302, USMC, was transferred to Marine Fighter Squadron-451.

14 February 1753

Lieutenant Colonel Harold A. HARWOOD, 00585/7302, USMC, assumed command of Marine Attack Squadron-251. Colonel HARWOOD commanded Marine Fighter Squadron-451 prior to his transfer.

Lieutenant Colonel Arthur N. NEHF Jr. 09391, USMC, presented a lecture to the pilots of this squadron on the situation in Korea.

18 February 1953

Fourteen (14) officers were detached for temporary additional duty under instructions to the Indoctrination Course (cutaway school) on the AD aircraft at NAS San Diego, California.

19 February 1953

Two pilots flying F4U-4 aircraft participated in the AIRLEX II maneuver. The two aircraft were used to lay a smoke screen.

20 February 1953

Fourteen (14) officers detached to the Indoctrination Course, completed their instructions and returned to MCAS, El Toro, California.

21 February 1953

Captain William H. BORTZ 032735/7333, USMC, presented a lecture to the

pilots of this squadron on the situation in Korea and the problems encountered during his recent tour with Marine Aircraft Group-12.

23 February 1953

Twenty three (23) enlisted men detailed to the Maintenance Course on the AD aircraft, completed their course of instructions and returned to MCAS, El Toro, California.

Nine (9) officers and one (1) enlisted man (NAP) were detached for temporary additional duty under instructions to the Indoctrination Course (cutaway school) on the AD aircraft at NAS, San Diego, California.

26 February 1953

Nine (9) officers and one (1) enlisted man (NAP) detached to the Indoctrination Course on the AD aircraft completed their instructions and returned to MCAS, El Toro, California.

27 February 1953

Eighteen (13) enlisted men were detached for temporary additional duty under instructions to the Maintenance Course on the AD aircraft at NAS, San Diego, California.

28 February 1953

Mr. BROWN, chief test pilot for the Douglas Aircraft Corporation, gave the pilots of this squadron a lecture on the AD type aircraft. It is felt that lectures of this caliber have enhanced the technical knowledge of the pilots CONFIDENTIAL SECURITY INFORMATION
