INTRODUCTORY SUMMARY

During the period covered by this report, Marine Attack Squadron-251 was located at the U. S. Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro (Santa Ana), California. The Commanding Officer from 1 April through 30 April 1953 was Lieutenant Colonel Harold A. HARWCOD 08585/7302, U. S. Marine Corps. This squadron is a unit of Marine Aircraft Group-15. During the period 1 April 1953 through 30 April 1953, Marine Attack Squadron-251 conducted an intensive training program designed to qualify all Naval Aviators and Naval Aviation Pilots, assigned to this squadron, for combat in the AD type aircraft.

Due to the limited facilities and targets available for use by this squadron at MCAS, El Toro, thirty-five (35) officers and one hundred fifty-seven (157) enlisted men were deployed to Naval Auxiliary Air Station, El Centro, California for a five (5) week training period from 12 April 1953 to 19 May 1953.

Extensive training is being conducted with the use of flares and all pilots are to receive a minimum of sixteen (16) hours bombing or strafing under flares.

This squadron is preparing for deployment to Korea in June 1953.

CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

1 April 1953

Fourteen officers from this squadron attended a lecture in the station theater on the evaluation of the Mark 7 Bcmb, given by Lieutenant Colonel YUNCK.

One (1) AD-3 Bureau No. 122765 was received from NAS Moffett, California.

Four (4) officers detached to the Indoctrination Course (cutaway school) on the AD aircraft at NAS San Diego, California, completed their instructions and returned to MCAS, El Toro, California.

Routine Working Day. (See Appendix II)

2 April 1953

Major Worrell P. NICHOLS, 025172/6708, USMC from MACG-3 presented a lecture to the pilots of this squadron on the operations and procedures of MPQ.

One (1) AD-4B, Bureau No. 132309, was received from NAS, San Diego, California. This was the first plane assigned to this squadron with UHF Radio.

5 April 1953

Holiday Routine. (See Appendix II)

6 April 1953

Ground School was held for all pilots in recognition, E6B computer, and ADF/MDF operations.

7 April 1953

Captain Dewey M. MARK 035475/7331 USMCR, assistant operations officer participated in test drops at Camp Fendleton using experimental ordnance.

10 April 1953

One (1) AD-4 Bureau No. 128989 was received from NAS, Alameda, California.
12 April 1953

Thirty-five (35) officers and one hundred fifty-seven (157) enlisted men departed for NAAS El Centro, California for a period of five (5) weeks intensive training. Nineteen (19) AD aircraft were flown by squadron pilots to NAAS El Centro this date.

15 April 1953

Captain James R. BLUNT 03505/7302 USMCR, experienced a loss of power and a rough engine, at all RFM's, while flying AL-16 Bureau No. 122790. Upon return to the base, paint, (Zinc Chromate) was found in the strainer. Investigation determined that the fuel strainer in a gas truck at NAAS, El Centro had been painted with zinc chromate. All planes were checked and paint was found in four (4) strainers.

16 April 1953

Representives from Curtiss Wright Aircraft Corporation presented a lecture on the performance and capabilities of the 3350-26 engine.

Second Lieutenant Waldo k. REYNOLDS 059772/7301 USMCR experienced an engine failure on take off in AL-15 when about fifty feet in the air and landed straight ahead on runway 26, an 8000 foot runway at El Centro. Ground test and a flight test hop the next day failed to determine the cause. It is believed that this engine failure was caused from paint in the gas as noted on Captain BLUNT's hop on 15 April 1953.

Major RANKIN presented a lecture on Close Air Support to all pilots of this squadron. Major RANKIN is assigned as an instructor in the Close Air Support School at the Naval Amphibious Base, Coronado, California.

20 April 1953

A disposition board was held on First Lieutenant James I. ELLIS 032417/7302 USMCR at MCAS, El Toro, California. Lieutenant ELLIS was grounded at his own request and the board requested that he be assigned to an Aviation Intelligence Billet.

The first flare drops were made this date using a somobouy dispenser.

22 April 1953

Two (2) AD-3 Aircraft Bureau No,'s 122780 and 122815 were received from NAS. Alameda, California.

24 April 1953

Captain SEMB, from MAG-15, conducted a briefing for all pilots on the forthcoming PHIBEX II Manuever.

25 April 1953

At 1957, Captain Milton A. WILSON 030817/7304 USMCR, made a wheels up landing in AL-6 Bureau No. 122762. Captain Wilson took a wave off when clearance to land was not received from the tower on his first approach and failed to extend his gear on the second and final approach. The plane received class B damage.

Eighteen officers and twelve enlisted men were dispatched to target 103-A to observe flare drops and night bombing. This observation indicated that the planes were easy to detect due to the reflection of light from the flares. Permission to change the color scheme of the aircraft to black with red markings has been requested. (See Appendix V)

27 April 1953

Captain James R. BLUNT, Squadron Intelligence Officer, conducted a briefing for all pilots on PHIBEX II.

28 April 1953

All nose flaps in the AD-4 aircraft were wired off this date. The automatic cowl flap regulators do not perform adequately and require constant CONFIDENTIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

checking by the pilot to prevent overheating of the engine.

One (1) AD-3 aircraft Bureau No. 122785 was received from NAS, Alameda, California.

Twelve (12) planes departed for MCAS, El Toro to participate in PHIBEX II. Eight planes were used for night close air support and two (2) planes for flare drops, with two (2) standbys.

29 April 1953

All scheduled flights for PHIBEX II from this squadron were cancelled due to weather at the target.

30 April 1953

Night close air support flights were conducted in Carrizo Valley with the aid of flares. Flights were controlled by a Forward Air Controller using a radio jeep located in the target area.

One (1) AD-4B aircraft Bureau No. 132316 was received from NAS, San Diego, California.

The alertness and quick thinking of Staff Sergeant Daniel E. BLASZAK 1136730/6519 prevented the possible damage of loss of an aircraft. While loading a sonobouy dispenser, a 1,000,000 candle power flare was released and ignited under the wing of an AD-4 aircraft. Sergeant BLASZAK pulled the burning flare to a clear area. The fire Department at NAAS El Centro was unable to extinguish the flare.
