Back to the Balkans...again



What was Yugoslavia is better known throughout history as the Balkans, a Turkish word for mountains. The rough and rugged terrain that characterizes the Balkans has been the cross-roads of empires for centuries. The Balkans have been divided and reconstituted numerous times over the years. The history of the Balkans is a fascinating story that could fift volumes. This is just a brief introduction.

As early as the tenth century, the area now known as Bosnia and Herzegovina was divided between the Catholic West and the Orthodox East ruled by the unstable Serbian empire. It was only a matter of time, however, before the Ottoman Turks invaded the Balkans and devastated the Serbians at the Battle of Kosovo — the Turks converted at least some of the population to Islam and the Muslim minority further complicated the religious map of the region. In 1878, Bosnia was turned over to Austria-Hungary, thus depriving the Serbians of what was rightfully theirs. World War I began in Sarajeve when a Serbian terrorist assassinated Austrian Archduke Ferdinand. It wasn't until after the First World War that Yugoslavia was born. In 1941, a German blitzkrieg overran the country and Yugoslavia was partitioned by the Axis powers. 1.8 million Yugoslavis died during WWII. Over half of those deaths, including 400,000 Serbs massacred during ethnic cleansing in Croatia, were the result of the civil war.

The Cold War managed to keep the six republics of Yugoslavia together. Now that the Cold War is over, the Balkan conflict has thawed as well. Ancient hatred has resurfaced, and the Balkan region has come apart at the seams. It is important to keep history in mind when discussing the Balkans. It is difficult for us in the West to understand many of the gridges that motivate the various ethnic factions in Bosnia. As you learn more about what is happening in Bosnia today,

The Ethnic Patchwork of the Former Yugoslavia

What used to be known as Yugoslavia was an attempt to bring together as one republics six and nation. autonomous regions with a population of 23 million people drawn from five ethnic groups using two alphabets. practicing three major religions, and speaking four different languages. Obviously, that didn't work out so well. It's easy to see from the map below why Bosnia is at the center of the Balkan conflict. There are three major ethnic groups in Bosnia.

Bosnian Serbs - Serbs are predominately Orthodox Christian Speak Serbo-Croatian but write it in the Cyrillic alphabet.

Bosnian Croats - Croatians are predominately Catholic Also speak Serbo-Croatian but write it in the Latin alphabet.

Bosnian Muslims - At the center of the stringgle for the Bosnia, the Muslims are not truly an ethnic group. They are instead distinguished by their practice of the Muslim religion.

Where is Herzegovina anyway?

Bosnia and Herzegovina's name is taken from two provinces that for the past three centuries have had a common historical, economic, and cultural development. The centrally located, nearly landlocked republic covered 20 percent of the total area of the former Yugostavia. Bosnia makes up four-fifths of this republic and Herzegovina the remainder. The former is a land of mountains with extensive forest cover and valleys. Herzegovina, with the exception of the Nerctva Valley is for the most pan a stony and dry wilderness. In general, hot summers and cold winters characterize the republic. Higher elevation areas have short, cool summers and long, severe winters.
